





One afternoon at the end of August, Catalina, who has just turned sixteen, leaves her best friend's house on a suburban housing estate after an unpleasant accident. 

But life and literature will soon combine to take him from one place to another: from an uncertain present to a past that isn't his, from a crumbling relationship to the discovery of new ways of expressing love, the unassailable happiness of writing, and the devastating bitterness of loss.

This is a story where everything comes together, just as it sometimes does in life: beginnings and endings, mourning and humor, reality and fiction. Maybe because that's the best way to put in words the love and pain that always abide in those we care about most.



What kind of daughter dares to speak the truth to her mother? It is required to turn to literature to do so, and also to question reality and, if necessary, to make it up. What could have turned out to be one of the happiest days in Marina's life, the day of birth of her only daughter, became the start of a relationship that was far from exemplary. 
